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Aflame with faith

In the Old Testament, fire often symbolizes the presence of God's Spirit. For example, God called to Moses from a burning bush (Exodus 3:2-6) and defeated the prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel (1 Kings 18:30-39). In the New Testament, tongues of fire rested atop the believers gathered on Pentecost (Acts 2:3).

Some Christians have described a burning or current-like sensation when they encounter God. Methodism founder John Wesley said his heart was "strangely warmed" during worship. After such an encounter, people often feel compelled to share the Good News of Jesus. The flame of faith inside one believer can spark a revival of faith in others. As Charles Spurgeon said, "A burning heart will soon find for itself a flaming tongue."



A house united

When President Lincoln declared in 1858, "A house divided against itself cannot stand," he was echoing Jesus. Scribes thought Jesus was casting out demons by Satan's power, so Jesus responded, "How can Satan cast out Satan? ... If a house is divided against itself, that house cannot stand" (Mark 3:23-25, NIV). There are countless modern examples: Civil wars. Families torn apart. Business partners going separate ways. Even churches splitting.

Jesus used the "house divided" image to point out the nonsense of the scribes' words. It takes someone other than the "strong man" (v. 27), or demon, occupying a space to cast that demon out. Evil can't drive out evil. Sin isn't stronger than sin. Hate doesn't solve hate. Violence doesn't end violence. Two wrongs don't make a right.

Jesus came to "bind" evil with goodness, conquer hate with love and teach us the same. Throughout the gospels, Jesus treats *all* people with love — even those who oppose him — so that, in the end, we all will be a house *united* by God's goodness.

You are my witnesses

John White (1924-2002) was a medical missionary, psychiatry professor, church planter and prolific author who wrote about faith and outreach. He refuted the notion that being an effective witness for Christ is akin to being a salesperson. Christians are representing and sharing a person, he said, not touting a product.

"A good witness is like a signpost," he added. "It doesn't matter whether it is old, young, pretty, ugly. It has to point the right direction and be able to be understood. We are witnesses to Christ; we point to him."

Pastor Allen's thoughts for the congregation

Ordained/Installed/Certified/Transitional

In every institution there are words that are unique to that group of people, and understanding them often requires a lexicon or an advanced degree. But we dare not oversimplify certain terms because they do have significant meanings which merely require explanation.

On May 5th, I will be *ordained* and *installed* as your *Certified Transitional* Pastor. What does all that mean? You might be saying, "We like you the way you are now, will you change?" The short answer is, "No, I will keep doing the things I've been doing but with some added authority."

To begin with, as an **Ordained** pastor I am affirmed by our governing body in our denomination (ECO- Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians) to pastor a local body of believers. I am accountable to them to practice sound theology and to lead our church according to the denominational constitution. I am also able to administer the two sacraments: The Lord's Supper and Baptism, and moderate Session.

To be **Installed**, is to be commissioned for a time to serve a this church. I am your pastor to lead, preach, moderate Session and be God's full-time servant in your midst.

As your **Transitional** pastor it is my role to do all the above but also to help prepare you for your next minister. Any pastor inputs his/her personality on a call, but I am doing this a little more quickly. There's a sense of urgency to deal with the past (good, bad and ugly), work in the present by equipping leaders, faithfully governing according to the Word of God and looking into the future and asking the hard questions.

I am **Certified** by our denomination. Again, I am held accountable to the standards of Scripture as well as best practices in leadership and church governance. I am regularly attending trainings both online and at ECO headquarters in Irving, TX. I also meet virtually with a coach who asks me challenges and encourages me to lead in a godly and biblical manner.

Last September Tracy and I attended our first training session in this area of transitional ministry. After serving churches, nonprofits and teaching overseas, we felt that this is an area that best uses my gifts. My coach, those doing the training and our denomination have all affirmed this, so we will finish out my career over the next ten years by serving churches in this way.

I want to thank you for the opportunity to serve 1st Presbyterian Monte Vista. I cannot imagine a better place to begin this ministry than here.

Christian symbol

GREEN — Green is the traditional liturgical color for the weeks after Pentecost (as well as the season of Epiphany). The Pentecost season largely overlaps with spring and summer, which is fitting because green symbolizes growth: growth of plant life and crops, and growth of the church in discipleship and faith.

When I don't know how to pray or what to pray for, Holy Spirit, help me in my weakness; intercede with your deep, wordless sighs (see Romans 8:26).

Open hands

Liturgical scholar Balthasar Fischer (1912-2001) shared an "a-ha" realization about the significance of praying with open, outstretched hands, an ancient practice. The opposite gesture, a closed fist, is used to threaten others or even inflict violence. We also grasp things in closed fists, refusing to let go, to share, to hold gently or loosely.

When we pray with open hands, Fischer explained, we're saying before God that we renounce "all highhandedness, all pride in [our] own sufficiency, all violence." We hold up our empty hands to God, saying, "I have nothing that I have not received from you, nothing that you have not placed in my empty hands. Therefore I do not keep a frantic hold on anything you have given me; therefore, too, I desire not to strike and hurt but only to give and to spread happiness and joy."

The language of lament

Unlike nonbelievers, Christians can grieve with hope (see 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18). On Memorial Day and at Christian funerals and burials, our lament is real — and it's a uniquely Christian concept, according to Pastor Mark Vroegop. "It takes faith to pray when you are in pain," he writes in *Dark Clouds, Deep Mercy*. "Belief in God creates challenging questions, and lament provides the opportunity to reorient your hurting heart toward what is true. But in order for that to happen, you have to turn to prayer. The silent treatment must end."

Vroegop, who had a stillborn daughter, says lament opens a door that leads to trust. Heartfelt lament, he says, can be brief or messy and can feel forced or uncomfortable. But the important thing is to "keep talking to God."

"Don't allow your fear, your despair or your track record of silence to cut off the flow of grace," he urges. "Your pain can be a path toward God if you'll allow lament to be your new language."



Though I've primarily known God as Father — along with metaphors such as rock, eagle, shepherd, potter — I also learned of Scripture passages portraying God as mother. For example (all NIV):

- "For a long time I have kept silent. ... But now, like a woman in childbirth, I cry out, I gasp and pant" (Isaiah 42:14).
- "As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you" (Isaiah 66:13).
- "Like a bear robbed of her cubs, I will attack them" (Hosea 13:8).
- In others, God is pictured doing traditional "women's work": making clothes (Genesis 3:21), sweeping (Isaiah 14:23), preparing and hosting a meal (Proverbs 9:1-6), baking bread (Luke 13:21).

One of my favorite images of God is tucked in Hosea. While many modern dads nurture their toddlers this way, the tender words surely call to mind a mama's care: "It was I who taught [Israel] to walk. ... To them I was like one who lifts a little child to the cheek, and I bent down to feed them" (Hosea 11:3-4). Most importantly, God — however known — is loving and good. —Heidi Hyland Mann

First-team followers

Jesus' ascension into heaven shortly after his resurrection was "one of God's most audacious ploys," according to Pastor Frank Ramirez. "Jesus, resurrected, is Master of space and time, yet he passes on the work of spreading the Good News to his imperfect disciples, who ultimately pass it on to us (who are also imperfect disciples)."

By contrast, most Old Testament patriarchs often stayed on the throne until they died. Many of them could have benefited from a timely "exit strategy," Ramirez notes.

"As a child, I always felt that the world would have been a better place if the resurrected Lord had just taken over everything," Ramirez continues. "But though Jesus is active with us ('For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them' — Matthew 18:20, NRSV), we're part of the first team now."

When Jesus saw the religious hypocrite, he exposed every self-righteous mole and pimple. "All their works they do to be seen by men" (Matthew 23:5 NKJV). This is the working definition of hypocrisy: "to be seen by men."

We must do good works. And some works, such as benevolence or teaching, must be seen in order to have an impact. To do a good thing is a good thing. To do a good thing to be seen, however, is a serious offense. Here's why: hypocrisy turns people away from God.

When people enter a church to see God yet can't see God because of the church, don't think for a second that God does not react. "Be especially careful when you are trying to be good so that you don't make a performance out of it. It might be good theater, but the God who made you won't be applauding" (Matthew 6:1 MSG).

Running slowly

At a track meet, we sat in the stands, cheering for our son. I chuckled as a young sibling of an athlete asked, "Why are they running so slow, Mommy?"

These athletes had been training for years, and many were setting personal best times and even state records. Most spectators would provide little competition for the runners. But the child was comparing how he'd felt while running at the park, sprinting to a soccer game.

Along the track, dozens of teammates and coaches cheered. Each time an athlete passed, she heard strong, pointed encouragement. "You've got this!" "Someone's approaching; time to pick up the pace!" "Great stride — keep going!" The coaches and runners knew what was helpful and understood how hard the athletes were working.

My point: Consider who you allow to speak truth into your life. Do you listen to loved ones who "train" alongside you? Or do you give sideline critics too much space in your thoughts? Heed Proverbs 2:2 (NLT), which advises, "Tune your ears to wisdom, and concentrate on understanding."



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JESUS LOVES ME

"For God so loved the world, He gave His only Son." John 3:16

Here is a story of how this Bible verse became a theme for the song, Jesus Loves Me.

Anna and Susan Warner lived in a lovely townhouse in New York City and their father was a successful lawyer. But the Panic of 1837 forced them to move and they became very poor. These two little girls needed to help with the family income so they began writing poems and stories for publication. One of their most successful projects was a novel titled "Say and Seal" in which a little boy named Johnny Fox was dying. His Sunday School teacher comforts him by taking him in his arms, rocking him and making up a little song. "Jesus loves me,, this I know; for the Bible tells me so."

This novel became a best seller, second only to "Uncle Tom's Cabin", and when the hymn writer, William Bradbury, wrote a childlike musical score to go with the words, it became the best-known child's hymn on earth. Despite their success, the Warner sisters never seemed to recover from the staggering financial reverses of 1836. They remained humble. For forty years, Anna and Susan conducted Bible class for cadets at West Point near their home. Both were buried with full military honors and are the only civilians buried in the military cemetery at West Point.
